Grow Up Reading[™] Tips for September: Counting

Ten

- At first, children memorize the counting words from about one to 10 or so. But their learning doesn't involve only memory. Children learn some ideas and rules about number too, namely that proper order is essential; numbers are different from letters; and you are not supposed to skip or repeat numbers when you count.
- One of the best ways for parents to help their children with math is to use math in the routines of daily life, either as games or as entertaining ways to solve problems. Make math fun! Puzzles, building blocks, board games and card games can all aid in the elevation of math skills.
- Giving your young child a chance to measure things can help her understand both how and why people measure things as well as the concepts of units of measurement, such as inches and feet. Find real measuring jobs for children to work on. Will this table fit here in this space? How tall are you? How much bigger is the plant than it was a month ago?
